Call to Order

Chair Showalter called the meeting to order at 10:03 a.m.

Public Comment on Matters Not Listed on the Agenda

Bruce Karney, Mountain View resident, commented on the similar goals of Silicon Valley Clean Energy (SVCE) and the Bay Area Air Management District (BAAD) to bend the carbon curve and commented on his attendance at the May 6, 2026 BAAD Board meeting in San Francisco. Mr. Karney shared his desire to persuade members of the BAAD Board to vote yes on Rule 9-6 in October, distributed his list of BAAD Board members (Attachment 1), and encouraged SVCE Committee members to reach out to BAAD members.

Consent Calendar

Prior to the consideration of the Consent Calendar, Chair Showalter announced a request from staff to move Item 5) *Recommend the Silicon Valley Clean Energy Board of Directors Authorize the Chief Executive Officer Approval of CC Power’s Fiscal Year 2026-2027 and Delegate Authority to the Chief Executive Officer to Enter Agreements Using Approved Funds* to the Consent Calendar.

Monica Padilla, Chief Executive Officer (CEO), provided a summary of the action requested for Item 5.

Chair Showalter opened Public Comment.
No speakers.
Chair Showalter closed Public Comment.

MOTION: Director Mekechuk moved and Director Meadows seconded the motion to approve the



Consent Calendar, Items 1 and 5.

The motion carried with Directors Martinez Beltran and Tyson absent.

2) CEO Update (Discussion)

CEO Padilla addressed the following in her report:

- Zoe Elizabeth, Director of Decarbonization Policy and Community Strategies, provided an update on recent BAAD meetings, and status of the build-out of SVCE's new headquarters.

Chair Showalter opened Public Comment.

No speakers.

Chair Showalter closed Public Comment.

3) Select Vice Chair of the 2026 Executive Committee (Action)

Director Martinez Beltran arrived during Item 3.

Andrea Pizano, Board Clerk, reviewed the process for the selection of the 2026 Vice Chair.

Chair Showalter opened the floor for nominations; Director Martinez Beltran and Director Mekechuk expressed interest.

Director Martinez Beltran provided a brief statement on her desire to serve as 2026 Vice Chair; Director Mekechuk withdrew his formal interest.

Chair Showalter opened Public Comment.

No speakers.

Chair Showalter closed Public Comment.

MOTION: Director Mekechuk moved and Director Klein seconded the motion to select Director Yvonne Martinez Beltran to serve as the 2026 Executive Committee Vice Chair.

The motion carried with Director Tyson absent.

Vice Chair Martinez Beltran left the room following the vote on Item 3.

4) 2026 Integrated Resource Plan Preview and Recommend the SVCE Board of Directors Delegate Authority to the Chief Executive Officer for Final Approval (Action)

Maren Wenzel, Director of Regulatory, Policy and Planning, and Jessica Feng, Power Resources Planner, presented information on the Integrated Resource Plan (IRP) process and draft results. Staff reviewed the following:

- California Public Utilities Commission (CPUC) purpose and requirements;



- Summary of proposed SVCE 2026 IRP and development process;
- Proposed Preferred Conforming Plan draft results;
- Proposed Alternate Conforming Plan draft results;
- A summary of additional analysis; and
- Key narrative components.

Staff responded to questions and comments on transmission viability, a suggestion to hold a special Executive Committee meeting if needed in July before submitting the IRP, consideration of the two plans (preferred and alternate), if the document is binding and if it is a living document, if all load serving entities (LSEs) are required to submit an IRP and how they are assessed, potential reasons why there was no plan required in 2024, if the IRPs from LSEs are public, curtailment, and clarification on the load forecast.

Chair Showalter opened Public Comment.

Bruce Karney commented on his previous experience in forecasting at Hewlett Packard, and the difficulty in measuring grid reliability.

Chair Showalter closed Public Comment.

CEO Padilla confirmed the item would be on the Regular Calendar for the June Board of Directors meeting, reiterated the request to hold a special meeting in July, if needed, to review the IRP submission, confirmed a request to include the IRP submission on the Consent Calendar at the August Board of Directors meeting, and confirmed a request for staff to offer one-on-one briefings for Board members interested in learning more about the proposed plans.

MOTION: Director Mekechuk moved and Director Klein seconded the motion to recommend the Silicon Valley Clean Energy Board of Directors at the June 10th meeting:

1. **Adopt the proposed Preferred Conforming Plan and Alternate Conforming Plan for submission in SVCE's 2026 IRP, acknowledging additional edits may be needed as work continues.**
2. **Delegate authority to the CEO for final approval of SVCE's 2026 IRP plan, due August 10th.**

The motion carried with Vice Chair Martinez Beltran and Director Tyson absent.

5) Recommend the Silicon Valley Clean Energy Board of Directors Authorize the Chief Executive Officer Approval of CC Power's Fiscal Year 2026-2027 and Delegate Authority to the Chief Executive Officer to Enter Agreements Using Approved Funds (Action)

This item was moved to the Consent Calendar.

6) Recommend the SVCE Board of Directors Approve the Financial Levers Playbook (Action)

Vice Chair Martinez Beltran returned during Item 6.

Justin Zagunis, Director of Customer Success, presented a request to the Committee to approve a proposed playbook that would capture priorities between levers, and at every future budget decision would help staff propose changes based on the playbook if needed. Staff recapped the levers and feedback, reviewed the Board recommendation, and reviewed the timeline and process for the playbook's potential approval.

Staff responded to questions and comments on SVCE's policy on Days Cash on Hand (DCOH), clarification that the proposed actions listed in the playbook could be implemented in no particular order with Board approval, if other CCAs have playbooks, comments on the rates lever and customer make-up, the GASB 62 reserve, split product offerings, program ineligibility if customers opt-down in the proposed split product concept, effectiveness of GreenPrime Direct, how many commercial customers are on GreenPrime and the cost for



residential customers, marketing of GreenPrime, and a suggestion to create a “Green Champion” product for customers who would like to pay more and make a bigger contribution to SVCE’s goals.

Chair Showalter opened Public Comment.

Bruce Karney commented on the following: 1) GreenPrime product premium, 2) Mountain View City Council’s upcoming study session on its five year greenhouse gas reduction plan, which assumes SVCE is and will remain carbon free, 3) according to Mr. Karney’s calculations there have been approximately 250 times that a California CCA rate has been either above or below PG&E’s price, and at least five agency years where they’ve gone above, which is worth studying, 4) inquiry of other CCA DCOH goals, 5) his opinion that reducing program spend is a sensible thing to do, and encouragement to communicate to customers, and 6) inquiry on internal forecasts on how power charge indifference adjustment (PCIA) will change, how PG&E’s prices will change, and how PG&E’s greenhouse gas emissions will change compared to SVCE’s over the planning horizon. Chair Showalter closed Public Comment.

Director Klein suggested the concept of a “Green Champion” option, where cities could approve to opt-in all residents to a specific threshold.

MOTION: Director Klein moved and Vice Chair Martinez Beltran seconded the motion to recommend the Silicon Valley Clean Energy Board of Directors approve the playbook of:

- Ongoing search for cost savings and efficiencies
- Maintain current levels of clean, programs, and rate discount (at minimum)
- If needed, introduce split product offerings to assess opt-out risk and interest:
 - One cheaper than PG&E but less clean and no program participation
 - One same as current default but at premium
- Scale up costs for both products over time if needed
- Incorporate small reduction/pause in programs; and
- Direct staff to plan to continue as-is for 2026 and 2027

In addition to taking in the comments shared from Committee members.

The motion carried with Director Tyson absent.

7) Recommend the Board of Directors Approve an Allocation of \$700,000 of Program Fund Dollars to Extend the Go Electric Advisor Program and Authorize the Chief Executive Officer to Execute an Amendment with the Sacramento Municipal Utility District (SMUD) to Extend the Term through June 2028 and Set a New Not-to-Exceed Amount of \$1.542 Million (Action)

Jessamyn Allen, Programs Lead, presented information on the Go Electric Advisor Program with a request to extend and authorize the CEO to amend an agreement with the Sacramento Municipal Utility District (SMUD).

Staff responded to questions and comments on the charges for the website and Salesforce administration, the extension cost of \$700,000, the cost of additional customers served, level of customer service, build out of an artificial intelligence (AI) product, preliminary tools for people exploring the program, rebate status, and encouragement to request contract renewals earlier.

Chair Showalter opened Public Comment.

Bruce Karney commented on the good feedback he’s heard about the program, noting that having human customer service support and not AI is a positive thing and encouraged SVCE to keep the human support. Mr. Karney suggested adding electrification volunteers to increase turnaround time for electrification questions. Chair Showalter closed Public Comment.

MOTION: Director Mekechuk moved and Director Klein seconded the motion to recommend the Silicon Valley Clean Energy Board of Directors approve an allocation of \$700,000 of programs fund dollars to



extend the Go Electric Advisor program and authorize the CEO to execute an amendment with SMUD to extend the term through June 2028 and set a new NTE amount of \$1.54M.

The motion carried with Director Tyson absent.

Committee/Staff Remarks

Chair Showalter announced her attendance at a San Francisco Bay Conservation and Development Commission (BCDC) meeting where a permit for a Transbay high-voltage power line laid at the bottom of the bay was discussed.

RECOMMENDATION

Staff requests the Silicon Valley Clean Energy (SVCE) Executive Committee receive an update on the Integrated Decarbonization Roadmap and provide feedback on concepts for SVCE's 2045 vision and SVCE's role in achieving that vision.

BACKGROUND

In 2018 SVCE published the "Decarbonization Strategy & Programs Roadmap" (https://svcleanenergy.org/plans-policies-reports/#flipbook-df_39881/1/) a public-facing document outlining SVCE's goals, strategic framework, decarbonization strategy, programs roadmap, and reporting and review structure. This guiding document was created with input from the Board of Directors (BOD), Member Agency Working Group (MAWG), stakeholders, and consultants and came together in a public-facing document. Core to this document was the identification of GHG reduction targets on our pathway to statewide carbon neutrality by 2045 in alignment with the legislative mandate established by Assembly Bill 1279 (2022) (https://leginfo.legislature.ca.gov/faces/billNavClient.xhtml?bill_id=202120220AB1279). Additionally, core program initiatives were identified to help us reach these ambitious GHG reduction targets.

In August and September of 2025 staff brought an informational presentation to the Executive Committee and Board of Directors, respectively, describing the need to revisit the original document and outlining the goals of the Integrated Decarbonization Roadmap effort, including the following three key deliverables:

1. Updated roadmap document

This document will include refined decarbonization targets, strategic guidelines around key focus areas, and program milestones to evaluate progress toward our goals over time.

2. Program evaluation framework

SVCE will develop a customized set of metrics to guide investment and track performance of programs toward our goals. This will also provide opportunity to prepare for potential future reporting requirements passed down through state legislation.

3. Reporting guidelines

An established cadence and protocol for evaluating and reporting program performance.

The document will answer three key questions:

1. What is SVCE's vision for 2045
2. What is SVCE's role in achieving this vision
3. How can SVCE track progress toward this goal?

To answer these questions and develop a set of draft strategic recommendations that will be brought to the Board in an August study session, staff have been conducting research and analysis and hosting workshops and interviews. A summary of key stakeholder meetings is as follows:

December 2025: SVCE Board of Directors workshop discussing high-levels values and trade-offs.

February 2026: MAWG and Community Leaders workshop on strategic priorities.

March 2026: SVCE staff workshop on strategic priorities.

April 2026: SVCE Board of Directors presentation on decarbonization pathways and electrification targets.

May 2026: Stakeholder expert interviews on decarbonization priorities and the role of CCAs.

Staff analysis and these stakeholder conversations have provided guidance in developing electrification targets, early recommendations, and now concepts for SVCE's vision and role to achieve that vision.

ANALYSIS & DISCUSSION

Overview

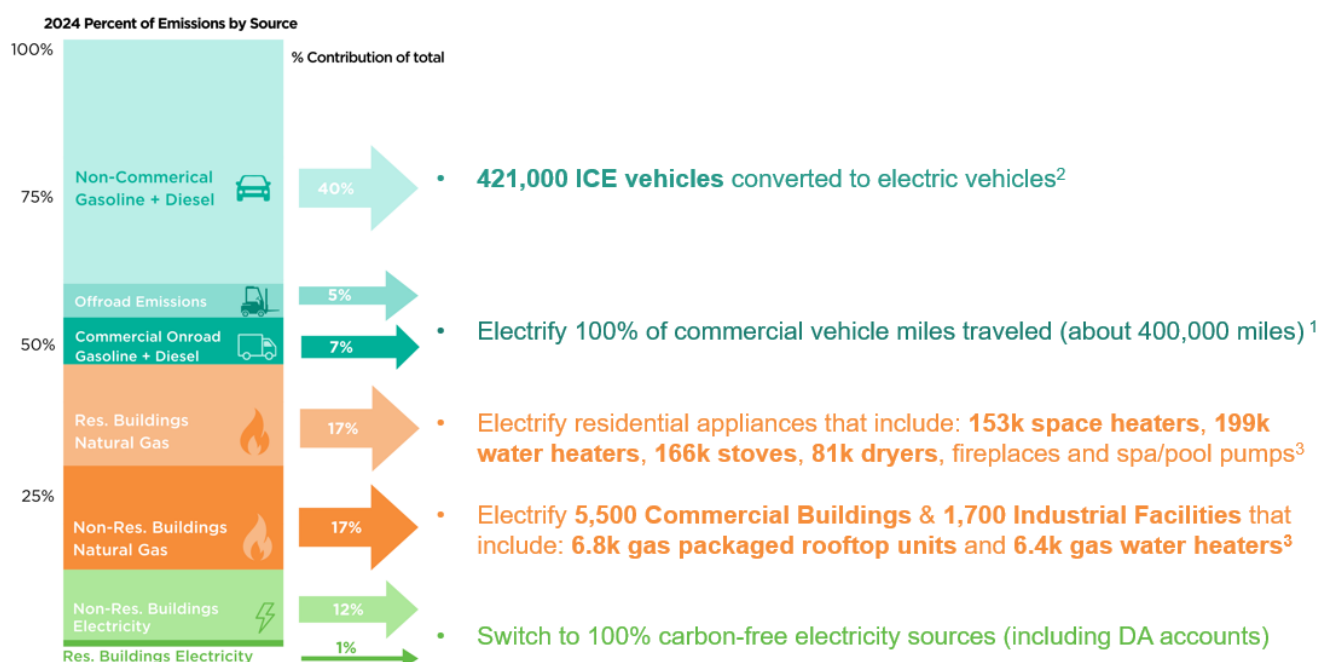


Figure 1. 2024 SVCE service area emissions by source. (Sources: SVCE 2024 Greenhouse Gas Inventory; SVCE's Vehicles dashboard; and SVCE 2022 Market Segmentation Study.)

To meet California's target of statewide carbon neutrality by 2045, all fossil-gas consuming appliances and passenger vehicles will need to be converted to zero-emission technology. Across SVCE service area this equates to slightly over one million residential machines, as illustrated in Figure 1 below plus tens of thousands of non-residential machines.

SVCE does not have the budget, nor the level of influence needed to electrify all one million machines directly by 2045 – for example, providing rebates for every residential gas water heater changeout would cost \$30M annually, not including additional costs to administer the rebates. Further, key components of success are outside of SVCE's influence, such as the variety, cost, and type of EVs manufacturers build and sell. Further, some technologies, including many industrial heat applications, currently do not have feasible zero-emissions replacement options and this technology development is beyond SVCE's sphere of influence. Strategic tradeoffs and prioritization must be made to best allocate SVCE's resources towards supporting decarbonization at scale throughout our service territory.

A primary goal of the Integrated Decarbonization Roadmap is to provide guidance on how to most effectively prioritize SVCE program investment over the next 5 years. Separate budget conversations inform the amount of money invested and deployed through SVCE programs, however the strategy underlying those investments remains consistent regardless of the annual program budget. Strategic recommendations are built on priorities and guiding values from the Board of Directors, as well as priorities and values from the community, Member Agencies, SVCE staff, and other stakeholders in the decarbonization landscape.

To inform the development of the strategic recommendations, SVCE staff gathered feedback from the SVCE Board and other key stakeholders. The following key takeaways summarize stakeholder feedback on SVCE's opportunities in the broader decarbonization landscape:

SVCE Board

- Prioritize emissions reductions and fast deployment
- Continue to be innovative, but pragmatic
- Focus on property owners who can take action with a balance of some programs and offerings across all customers
- Ensure decarbonization strategies lead to community-wide benefits

Local Stakeholders

- Emphasize incentives and rebates
- Support local policy and ecosystem improvements to reach emissions reductions
- Less clear on innovation and customer incentives balance

Staff

- Invest in customers with the highest need and ensure benefits for all
- SVCE role in innovation is unclear
- Tension between targeted incentives and deep incentives

Other Stakeholder Feedback (Building Decarbonization Coalition, Natural Resources Defense Council, BayREN, etc.)

- Only agency in a position to play the "facilitator" role by interfacing between state agencies, PG&E, member agencies, Housing Authority, contractors, and customers.
- Can help stabilize the market by providing consistent rebate offerings to mitigate the ebb and flow of other incentives.
- Uniquely positioned to offer market-rate decarbonization programs, unlike CPUC-funded programs which are limited to equity programs.
- Nimble and data-rich, CCAs can discover patterns, draw conclusions, and adapt programs in a way no other implementer can.
- Play an oversized role by sharing data and learnings with state agencies to inform policy development.

Based on staff analysis and this feedback staff is developing 1) an SVCE Decarbonization vision statement, 2) a set of strategic priorities that articulate SVCE's role in meeting this vision. Staff will present this proposal for Board feedback at an August 2026 Board study session.

At this time, staff is seeking Executive Committee input on:

- A draft vision statement and set of values
- Balance of investment in expensive and/or difficult to electrify programs
- Defining SVCE's role in innovation

Staff will incorporate feedback from the Executive Committee into the strategic recommendations presented during the August 2026 Board Study Session, which ultimately feed into the final recommendations included in the roadmap document presented in October 2026 for adoption.

Planned Timing and Approach

The Integrated Decarbonization Roadmap is scheduled for completion by October 2026. Major milestones include (subject to change):

- June 2026: Executive Committee presentation – draft strategic recommendations;
- August 2026: Board of Directors special study session – draft recommendations and roadmap;
- October 2026: Final documents presented to Board of Directors for approval;
- December 2026: Public release and celebration.

STRATEGIC PLAN
